#### **CARB Truck Reporting Due this Month**

The California Air Resources Board (CARB) has two truck regulations potentially affecting trucks used on dairies. The first is for the Truck and Bus Rule, which has been around for over a decade and half and applies to trucks with 2009 and older diesel engines. These trucks must be under the Low Use Exemption, travel less than 1,000 miles per year in California and report their odometer readings annually to CARB to continue to register with the DMV. If you have a truck operating under the Low Use Exemption, remember to report by the end of the month. If you purchase a truck with a 2009 or older engine you can apply for the Low Use Exemption on that truck. If you need any help or have questions on this, you can reach out to me

The second regulation is the Clean Truck Check, a smog check program for heavy-duty trucks. This applies to trucks used in agriculture, including trucks with Special Equipment plates and low use vehicles described above. This rule does not apply to gasoline-powered vehicles. 


### WEEKLY MARKET UPDATE

US cheese exports were higher year-over-year in November thanks in large part to healthy interest from Mexico. Butter trade also surged for both imports and exports. But milk powder exports dropped to 119 million pounds, the lowest monthly volume since August 2019.

- CME cheese markets started the new year by climbing, with spot blocks reaching the mid-\$1.90s and barrels advancing to the upper-\$1.80s for the first time since October. But after several days of increases, both ran out of steam and eased a bit, to close in the low \$1.90s for blocks and mid-\$1.80s for barrels.
- The CME butter market has been relatively quiet and range-bound. While there's ample cream flowing, there's still enough concern to keep prices in the upper-\$2.50s.
- According to USDA's November Dairy Products report, US total cheese production dropped at a faster pace than average, while butter output climbed, but at a slower-than-expected rate. Milk powder output ticked up on the month, but tumbled on the year, continuing the recent trend of slower production.



- Milk powder prices slipped at this week's GlobalDairyTrade auction as China pulled back on its buying. Skim milk powder dipped 2.7% to \$1.22 per pound and whole milk powder declined 2.2% to \$1.73 per pound.
- Lower global prices and weak export interest haven't knocked CME NDM out of its mid-\$1.30s trading range. But trading volume in Chicago has been heavy, with 26 lots changing hands for the first four trading days of 2025.
- Nearby corn and soybean contracts have been in a seesaw pattern, moving up and down along with weather reports and export news. Analysts are watching to see how USDA's *Quarterly Grain Stocks, Annual Crop Production* and *World Agricultural Supply and Demand Estimates* reports, due out Friday, will impact the markets.
