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


### WEEKLY MARKET UPDATE

US cheese exports started 2025 strong, with 102.9 million pounds shipped in January. That was well above prior-month and prior-year levels. But nonfat dry milk volumes were weaker as higher prices at the start of the year cut competitiveness.

- After hitting a new recent low of \$1.6050 per pound, both blocks and barrels found enough support to climb back into the mid-\$1.60s. Trading volume has been heavier. For the week ending March 7, 41 loads of blocks changed hands, the busiest week since April 2024.
- With the recent drop in CME cheese, second quarter Class III futures fell to new low prices in recent days. April Class III futures have dropped over \$2 per hundredweight since early February.
- Low prices triggered some buying interest in the CME butter market, while historicall high cream levels keep prices from climbin too high. Spot butter rose back into the \$2.30s and volume is strong.
- · Weak domestic demand pressured the CME

- nonfat dry milk market as low as \$1.1550, a price last seen in May 2024. The lower price puts US product below global competitors, possibly encouraging export interest.
- According to USDA's January Dairy Products report, cheese output increased at an above-average pace, while butter production was in line with the five-year average. NDM output continued to lag.
- USDA's March World Agricultural Supply and Demand Estimates report was neutral for corn and soybeans. Most stock estimate numbers were within pre-report expectations.
- March 31 is the deadline to sign up for the 2025 DMC program. Estimates based on current futures markets are included in the table on the next page. These estimates will change daily with the markets.
